
s America began its love affair with suburbs in the 1950s, millions flocked out of cities to make their homes on tree-lined streets with neat plots of grass and white picket fences. Nowhere was this exodus more striking than New York City to Long Island.

Yet being the next-door neighbor to the country's economic powerhouse created an assortment of formidable challenges. Our island had to resolve comparable issues regarding poverty, employment, and affordable housing but without the city's more significant resources. Issues of race and immigration also had to be addressed as did the growing number of elderly. How could such a small region with limited means meet the needs of so many?

For 60 years, Catholic Charities has helped answer that question.

Founded by Bishop Walter P. Kellenberg in 1957, Catholic Charities served 1,124 people with just 11 staff members at two offices that first year. But as communities grew so did we, most specifically in response to changing crisis. Various waves of immigration, the explosion of teenpregnancies, rampant substance abuse, the AIDS/HIV epidemic, terrorist attacks and even natural disasters—through it all Catholic Charities has been there, responding with programs that help rebuild lives.

Today, we're one of the largest human service providers on Long Island, maintaining an extensive network of over 60 sites from Elmont to the East End. More than 600 employees and 300 volunteers serve an average of 55,000 people each year of every faith and background and at every stage of life. And while people may change and needs have too, what has remained constant is Catholic Charities' heartfelt concern and love and our promise to bring *Care With Dignity...Life With Hope* to our most vulnerable Long Island neighbors.






The **students of Holy Trinity High School** spread joy as they hosted their 5th Spring Fling dance for more than 100 of our developmentally disabled residents.
