

During Catholic Schools Week celebrations in the Diocese of Rockville Centre, Catholic Charities of Long Island met with nearly 3,000 students at six Catholic elementary schools, sharing how Charities offers compassionate care to the needy and vulnerable.

Danielle Campbell, Director of Development and Communications at Catholic Charities of Long Island, inspired students by sharing the importance of putting faith into action. Campbell told students how happy she was to be working at Catholic Charities "We are Catholic, but we help all people, all faiths, all backgrounds." EVERY PENNY COUNTS

Before Catholic Schools Week, St. Agnes Cathedral School gave an amazing gift of support to CCLI's Regina Maternity Services program benefiting new mothers and their babies. During Respect Life Month in October, the school's 602 students took part in a "Baby Bottle" fundraiser. Filling the bottles with their family's spare change raised an astounding total of \$6,100.

"We could not believe the response from the children and families. It just took hold," said St. Agnes principal Cecilia St. John, who credited Bishop John O. Barres with the initial motivation to consider Catholic organizations for fundraising opportunities.

St. Aidan School students collected \$1,000 for the Meals on Wheels program as its Catholic Schools Week service project. Plans are underway to visit other Catholic elementary schools during Lent.
