

She came to Catholic Charities Project Independence and we provided her the housing and services to start over and reunite with her son. Today, life looks a whole lot brighter. Beth has started her new job and her son is a happy teen, making friends and keeping up in school. Best of all, they're a family again in a place they call their own.

Everyone remembers the day we met Lyisha at a Catholic Charities picnic several years ago. She stood perfectly still, stared at the ground, and didn't say a word to anyone. It was no wonder. A traumatic home life left her terribly afraid to connect with anyone, although she longed for friends and a family life. When she moved into one of our homes for the developmentally disabled, she wouldn't make eye contact for months. But she received the patience she deserved and found the trust that she sought. Today, Lyisha is one of our most outgoing residents. She bowls weekly in a league, sings in a choir, is an altar server in her parish, takes dance lessons, and plays for a local softball team. A hug and a smile are her calling cards.

Milton had to get as far away from the devastation as possible. With an estimated 70,000 dead and 25 percent of the population displaced as refugees, the civil war in his native El Salvador had wreaked destruction on the lives of everyone he knew. With nowhere else to turn, he looked to Catholic Charities' Immigrant Services and Refugee Resettlement program. We helped him obtain Temporary Protected Status, a condition our country reserves for those who can't go home because of armed conflicts or natural disasters. Then, with admiration and love for the country that had welcomed him, Milton set out on a new journey. Today, he is an American citizen and small business owner whose only worry is the number of starters and alternators his shop repairs.

Licia stepped off the plane at the airport with her newborn, Ameer, and not a soul had come to meet them. She was afraid of this. When she became pregnant at 15, her father angrily threw her out of his home. The baby's father wanted nothing to do with a child so Licia quit school and flew to her mom's side. Now, with a newborn, her mother was simply unable to care for her and Ameer. Alone in a crowded airport, she desperately called a friend who put her in touch with Catholic Charities Regina Residence for unwed, young mothers. There, for the first time, she heard that she and her son didn't have to go it alone – that there was a community of neighbors who supported her decision to keep her baby. Today, their lives are full of laughter and love. She's graduated high school, is enrolled in a local college, and holds down a part-time job. But her greatest joy is keeping up with Ameer, and being part of the dynamic duo.
