You could say Long Island needs some shelter from the storms. Just as we were recuperating from 2011's Tropical Storm Irene, we were battered by an even more severe Superstorm Sandy. She ripped down trees, robbed us of power, flooded our streets and our homes, destroyed our beaches and even brought on a stalemate in Washington, D.C. But in the midst of the mayhem, something beautiful happened.

Without missing a beat, hundreds of people like you were at Catholic Charities' doorstep, rolling up their sleeves and asking, "How can we help?" Overnight, our parking lot was transformed into a distribution center for truckloads of emergency supplies pouring in from around the country. We were also at the heart of tremendous financial support and thus far we've provided \$2.1 million in direct financial assistance to hundreds of families in hard-hit communities throughout Long Island.

I'm reminded of the Gospel passage about the panic-stricken apostles trapped on a boat being rocked by a storm. Jesus remains deep in prayer on shore until, in their moment of despair, they spot Him walking across the water toward them.

...Jesus spoke to them, "Take courage, it is I; do not be afraid." Peter said to him in reply, "Lord, if it is you, command me to come to you on the water." He said, "Come." Peter got out of the boat and began to walk on the water toward Jesus. But when he saw how strong the wind was he became frightened; and, beginning to sink, he cried out, "Lord, save me!" Immediately Jesus stretched out his hand and caught him, and said to him, "O you of little faith, why did you doubt?"

Peter did the impossible; he walked on water. But as soon as he took his eyes off of our Lord and let fear distract him, he began to sink.

The Church Responds

Before the first drop of rain fell, Catholic Charities' response to Superstorm Sandy has relied on inspired and energetic collaboration between staff, volunteers, Catholic schools, pastors, and parish social ministry programs across the Diocese of Rockville Centre. YOUR GENEROUS SUPPORT has already accomplished much toward rebuilding our region.

- Long Island's creative, resourceful parishes were the first line of the Church's response to Superstorm Sandy. They served meals, opened their doors as warming centers and charging stations, accepted and distributed donations, and so much more. They are the heart of the Church's response and the core of our communities.
- To date, the generosity and compassion of donors like you has also allowed our **Disaster Response Fund** to distribute \$2.1 million to 1,800 households in the hardest hit communities. This includes \$550,000 given by faithful Catholics to a collection in parishes throughout the Diocese of Rockville Centre. These funds feed families, repair roofs, replace boilers, eliminate mold, and help in many other ways.
- Immediately after the storm, donated supplies poured in to Long Island from across the country. Catholic Charities received tractor-trailers full of non-perishable foods, bleach, power tools, blankets, and other useful items. They were given to families in need by parishes in Amityville, East Rockaway, Freeport, Island Park, Lindenhurst, Long Beach, and other impacted communities.

 Looking toward long-term recovery, a team of Catholic Charities disaster case managers continues reaching out to storm survivors, assessing their needs, developing individualized recovery plans, and walking with these Long Islanders on their journeys toward renewed stability. Spiritual counseling is also available to storm survivors. If you or someone you know needs help, please call (631) 608-8882.
 Superstorm Sandy reminded us all that God is often closest to us

when He seems furthest away, when we suffer. The outpouring of love that met Sandy's downpouring of rain is testament to that. The road to recovery is long, so we ask for your continued prayers for those rebuilding in the storm's wake.

A south shore family assisted by our Disaster Response Fund sends their personal thanks to you on sheetrock being used to rebuild their home. Generous supporters like you funded the program with donations of more than \$2 million and every penny was directly distributed to hard-hit families.

Some Things Remained

Il we could think about was how to survive. With three small children we had to figure out where to sleep, what to eat, where to wash, and how to get clean clothes. We felt like zombies that whole first week."

When Erin Bevilacqua and her family returned to their Amityville home the day after Superstorm Sandy, they discovered their entire first floor under three feet of water and sewage. The gas and electrical lines had been severed, their car was beyond repair, and all their personal belongings had been destroyed. It took weeks before their electricity returned and by that time, mold had set in throughout the house. Everything had to be torn out and carted away. Although they qualified for FEMA rental assistance there was no vacancy anywhere on Long Island. The family spent the winter huddled together in one room, with duct-taped windows and portable heaters running on emergency generators.

To make matters worse, her husband lost his father and his job during the whole ordeal. "Everything that could go wrong, did go wrong," says Erin, "but there was a light in all that darkness."

That light was the Parish Social Ministry (PSM) team at St. Martin's in Amityville, who delivered food, clothes, cleaning supplies and gift cards to the struggling family. They even provided Thanksgiving meals and toys at Christmas. "But it was Catholic Charities' Disaster Relief Fund that saved our home. That financial support paid our mortgage when there was no money coming in. There were no endless application forms, no jumping through hoops. Just real help when we needed it most."

Today, Erin and her family are rebuilding their lives and our Disaster Case Management team is with them every step of the way. Erin concludes, "It seemed like we lost everything to Superstorm Sandy, but actually some things remained. We had family, friends, and a place in the heart of people like you at Catholic Charities."

On October 29, 2012, the home of Erin and her family was almost completely destroyed by Superstorm Sandy. With the help of Catholic Charities Disaster Case Management they are rebuilding their lives.

Our 2012 Program Highlights

On March 3, 2012, Catholic Charities hosted the **Diocesan Public Policy Convocation** entitled: "Catholics in the Public Square: Our Role in Shaping Public Policy." The event was attended by more than 600 people who turned out for a panel of experts including Cardinal Timothy Dolan of New York, who addressed religious freedom in light of the Obama administration's new Health and Human Services mandate.

In its second full year of operation, our **Women**, **Infants & Children** (WIC) program opened its third location and its first Suffolk site in Amityville. It will help provide nutritious foods, nutrition education, and health and social service referrals to more than 500 low-income pregnant and postpartum women in Suffolk County.

Through a grant from Island Outreach Foundation, our Parish Social Ministry (PSM) program initiated Home & Hope, a project which responds to previously financially stable families that are now struggling under the weight of the lingering economic downturn. The program provides subsidies to maintain housing and help obtain employment. It also provides mentors who assist each family in developing long-term goals and the corresponding strategies necessary for a return to self-sufficiency.

This past fall, our **Chemical Dependence Clinic in Commack** began services specifically for Spanish-speaking people who are struggling to reclaim their lives from substance abuse. Services are currently available three nights per week and include: transportation to and from the sessions, individual and group counseling, nutritional and medical evaluations, educational programs, psychiatric services, and vocational assessments and referrals.

In 2012 our **Volunteer Services Department** relied on the energy, enthusiasm and goodwill of 2,217 Long Islanders to help us serve more than 60,000 neighbors. A total of 212 volunteers were involved with disaster relief efforts where they played a vital role in establishing an island-wide network that collected and distributed thousands of pounds of disaster relief to communities battered by Superstorm Sandy.

Our **Disaster Case Management (DCM)** office opened in August 2012 to respond to the ongoing needs from Hurricane Irene with a \$1 million grant administered by the New York State Office of Emergency Management and funded by the U.S. Department of Homeland Security. DCM staff help disaster victims navigate and access a wide array of resources and they were uniquely prepared to help when Superstorm Sandy struck.

Seniors are one of Long Island's fastest growing populations, and together with you we help maintain their independence and see to their physical and emotional well-being. Mary attends one of our Senior Community Service Centers where she meets with friends and gets nutritious meals, health services, joins in recreation and can even take a class or two.
