

# **Catholic Charities Senior Services** July, 2012

Catholic Charities provides a wide range of services that help Long Island's seniors live independently while promoting their physical and emotional well-being throughout the year. July was an average month so let's take a look:

18.000 meals were delivered to 700 homebound seniors • 2.500 pints of milk were consumed at our 5 Senior Community Centers • 17 Case Managers helped nearly 500 seniors stay safely in their homes • We had 200 BINGO winners at our senior clubs • More than 100 senior center participants also volunteered to help others • 9,600 low-income seniors received free food packages through our Commodity Supplemental Food Program • Approximately 288,000 pounds of food were distributed to them • There were 1,298 Catholic Charities Senior Apartments occupied by 1,412 seniors • 48 of those seniors were in residence at Bishop Daly Gardens, where 360 loads of laundry were washed, 3 light bulbs changed and 2 toilets repaired
